## **!! NEW PUBLICATION FROM BCHS !!** THE GREAT FIRES IN WISCONSIN OF 1871

October 8, 1871, commemorates the deadliest fire in American history.

Often referred to as the Peshtigo Fire, this wildfire took an estimated 1,200 to possibly 2,500 lives. The fires consumed portions of Brown, Kewaunee, Oconto and Southern Door counties, as well as a section of the Upper Peninsula of Michigan. Popular folklore described the wildfire as jumping the bay of Green Bay although evidence supports that the fire was actually several separate fires that started on both sides of the bay of Green Bay.

In days following the fires, Frank Tilton, Green Bay Advocate editor, interviewed survivors from the affected communities. He compiled eyewitness accounts of the destruction, devastation and deaths in a publication to document and preserve the facts. Along with the scenes of blackened corpses and streets strewn with dead farm animals, Tilton describes instances of heroism, love and responses of support for Wisconsin sufferers.

In the 60th anniversary year — 1931, historian Deborah B. Martin suggested that the Society reprint Frank Tilton's "Sketch of the Great Fires in Wisconsin . . . " in the Green Bay Historical Bulletin. It appeared as Vol. 7, parts 1 and 2, 1931. Today, to commemorate the 150th anniversary of the fires, the Society is republishing the book with enhanced information.

Since 1931, many studies of the factors that united to create the fires' origin(s) and causes have been reviewed,

analyzed and written. The Society included two scientific articles in this current publication in order to pro-

vide contemporary information regarding the weather patterns that set Northeastern Wisconsin ablaze. Professor Jerrold Rodesch, reviewer for this updated edition of the book, emphasizes the combination of Tilton's contemporary version of witness descriptions, in combination with the modern understanding of climate and wildfire provided by Moran, Somerville and Hopkins, resulting in the best historical perspective available to date.

## From Our Collections...



Hon. Albert M. Rosenblatt, who served on New York's Court of Appeals (2000–2007), reached out to the Society recently as he is writing an article about Melancton Smith (1744-1798). Smith was an im-

portant figure in 1788 at the Convention in Poughkeepsie, New York, when New York ratified the United States Constitution, thus joining the Union. He had four children, but his oldest, Richbell (sometimes spelled "Richbill") Mott Smith, died off the coast of Japan in 1800 when he was only 20 years old. Judge Rosenblatt discovered that the only known depiction of Richbell was located at Hazelwood Historic House when he did a newspaper search and found the article about Hazelwood in the July 18, 1965, issue of the *Green Bay Press Gazette* (p. 13, online at <a href="https://www.newspapers.com/image/189172085/?terms=richbell&match=1">https://www.newspapers.com/image/189172085/?terms=richbell&match=1</a>). He contacted us and requested a photograph of Richbell for his article.

The painting of Richbell hung prominently on the staircase wall while the Martin family lived at Hazelwood. Elizabeth (Smith) Martin was the grand-daughter of Melancton Smith (1744-1798), daughter of Col. Melancton Smith

(1780-1818), and sister of Adm. Melancton Smith (1810-1893). The painting eventually traveled to Purcellville, Virginia, with the Martins' granddaughter, Helen Martin Pancoast, who bequeathed, upon her death, original Martin family artwork and furniture to the recently established Hazelwood Historic House. The original painting is located at the Neville Public Museum of Brown County and a copy hangs in its original location in Hazelwood.

An anonymous account, thought to be written by Deborah Martin or Helen Martin Pancoast, tells a romantic tale handed down through the family. According to the story, Richbell's mother outfitted a ship, hired a captain and crew, and sent her son, grieving over a broken love affair, to traffic in ivory along the African coast. The ship landed on the coast of Madagascar to carry on trade and Richbell vanished into the interior. After making a diligent but fruitless search for Richbell, the ship's master determined the natives had murdered him and sailed back home with the news.

The documentation of Richbell's death in 1800 does not provide a cause of death and remains a mystery.
